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From The Chairman...

Greetings from the Chair!

On behalf of this year's executive committee, fencing club owners, and the fencers of the USFA Georgia Division, I would like to express my thanks to last year's Executive Committee for doing a fantastic job in keeping the division on track and running smoothly! Last year saw explosive growth of new fencers, new clubs, and new family and friends being added to our Georgia Fencing community as a result.

The USFA 2010 Summer Nationals were a big success with over 3,800 fencers competing in our own backyard in 100 events over 10 days at the Georgia World Congress Center. Even the newly added veteran 70 age group events saw some rare pearls with some of the former greats in American fencing on the strip. It was also fun to watch former champions like Paul Apostle, former US Saber Champion scratching his head in confusion over the new saber rules implemented since last he competed. One evening, after rounding up the daily lost and found, I took a stroll down memory lane while viewing the pictures of past champions and coaches posted on the walls for the USFA Hall of Fame dinner. I even came across a photo of my former fencing coach Mel North. There is a rich history of fencing in America and if you get the chance look up Andy Shaw, Hall of Fame Master of Ceremonies and founder of the American Fencing Hall of Fame located in Shreveport Louisiana. Didn't see my picture there though... AW NUTS perhaps someday!

Many of our Georgia fencers made a great showing as well with about 130 Georgians competing in all age catego-

ries and skill levels including a surprise Gold Medal in epee from a local foil fencer and upcoming talent Alex Chiang from Athletic Club Northeast. Many thanks to all who jumped in to help (thanks Andy Q.) to get those pool and D.E. sheets posted. Their efforts really made the tournament run very smoothly overall. The head office always likes that! And although we didn't wind up with a marching band, the nationals saw some pretty good talent for the playing of the national anthem from singers to violinists to even an electric guitar performance - tastefully done of course. One morning we even over scheduled and almost had a violin / electric guitar duet.

Back to the local scene: The season is off to a great start and we anticipate tremendous growth in our sport! It never ceases to amaze me how many new fencers are appearing on the radar screen even as our nation confronts a challenging economy. This bodes well for our continued growth and success. We are bursting at the seams but it's a good problem to have!

Last year, the Georgia High School Fencing League grew with amazing speed with 14 schools competing in 4 counties. Even our division officers attended the GHSFL Championship. This year a new 3 weapon high school fencing league called "En-Guarde" has just been formed and promises to bring even more fencers into the fold. Middle schools are also coming forward and expressing their interest in starting their own fencing clubs as well. On the college scene, Georgia Tech and some of the other local colleges appear to be steam-rolling along as their programs continue

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Regional Youth Circuit Tournaments

Fifty-five percent of all USFA members are 15 years old or younger. What better evidence that the sport of fencing is undergoing a rapid upsurge in growth and popularity on the grass roots level?

The Regional Youth Circuit (RYC) is the group of youth tournaments for Y14, Y12, and Y10 fencers. The rationale is to provide educationally valuable tournament experiences without the stress of extensive travel. The first youth competition is an important part of development in the sport of fencing, for athletes and their parents. There are no points awarded for RYC events, but they do serve as a qualifying path for Youth-10 and Youth-12 fencers to get to a NAC and the Summer National Championships.

(Fencers must attend AND fence their event to qualify for the NAC and Summer Nationals.) There is also a Super Youth Circuit (SYC) which is a group of national level youth tournaments for the same age groups which allow the fencers to earn national points.

Important information:

- Fencers who compete in a Y12 or Y10 event at a Regional Youth Circuit competition or a Super Youth Circuit competition are automatic qualifiers for the Y12 or Y10 events at Summer Nationals. Fencers qualify for the event of the same age level and weapon they competed in at an RYC or an SYC.
- RYCs do not award points. Points are awarded at the Super Youth Circuit tournaments, Youth NACs and Summer Nationals.
- Fencers may compete in any RYC or SYC in the nation.
- At RYCs, boys and girls events may be combined if the number of entries is small (5 fencers or fewer). At the SYCs, Youth NACs and Summer Nationals, boys and girls will fence separately.
- Y14 fencers must qualify for Nationals through their Division Y14 Qualifiers or be on the US National Y14 Rolling Point List for that weapon. Y14 is not like Y10 and Y12, where participating in a RYC or SYC is enough to qualify.

Notes from the Division Secretary

In order to make sure that your classification change is processed quickly and accurately by USFA, please have your USFA number with you at any tournaments you attend, and please let the tournament director know exactly how your name appears on your USFA card.

Communication in our division happens via email and with notices on our website. Fencers (and their parents) can sign up to receive emails via the division list server on the division website:

(<http://gafencing.org>). Divisional qualifying tournament communication will happen via the list server and emails sent through AskFred. Information should also be posted in member fencing clubs.

Periodic newsletters will also have information and announcements, but they will be distributed through the list server and posted on the division website.

All divisional qualifying tournaments, the division championships, and most divisional tournaments are posted on AskFred. We have a

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Guide to the Perfect Tournament

A well-run event brings respect to your club, and people will come back again to your future meets. Besides, your fellow-members of the Georgia Division (who often traveled many miles and paid good money to participate) deserve to have their officially-sanctioned tournaments well-organized and run efficiently.

With respect to preparation: Carefully consider the events you will offer. Included in that process should be the number of complete and working strips you will have available and the number of competitors you can reasonably expect. Set your estimated starting times with some care. Fencers have a bad taste in their mouth when an afternoon event is

delayed for several hours because strips aren't available. Come up with a "do-able" schedule.

Advertise your meet on AskFred in a timely manner. A minimum of 30 days in advance is suggested.

If you see that registration numbers are going differently than what you expected, recalculate your starting times and email all the participants in a timely manner.

Arrange for referees well ahead of time; seven strips means seven referees. And our by-laws specifically address the matter of refereeing from pools, discouraging this practice except in rare cases.

Arrange for volunteers to handle such procedures as check-in, registration, weapons check, and data entry as the meet progresses.

Have a clean club on the day of the meet – some extra time the day before making sure the floors are not slippery, that there is toilet paper in the bathrooms, etc., will generate good feelings from the participants

With respect to running the meet: Have your referees and volunteers arrive in a timely manner. Opening the club an hour ahead of time is a good idea.

Verify that everyone is a USFA member, either by checking that their membership card is current (check the expiration date) or checking

on-line (if available) the membership list on the USFA website. If a fencer's membership cannot be verified, require them to complete a new application, with payment, until you can verify their membership

Be sure that you check the current ratings of fencers in your database in Fencing Time—ratings change every weekend.

As a meet manager, your chief job is to keep the meet moving. In-

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United States Fencing Coaches Association

The USFCA is the professional organization of fencing coaches at all levels, from those just learning to assist in training beginners, to Fencing Master. The primary goals of the USFCA are developing coaches, certification, and providing support for its members.

The organization is ably led by Fencing Master and President Abdel Salem, Head Coach of the U.S. Air Force Academy. The U.S. is divided into five regions. Fencing Master Gene Gettler was recently elected as Vice-President for the Southeast Region.

Seven members of the GA Division recently attended the USFCA Annual Conference in Louisville. Over a 3 day period more than 80 fencing coaches of all levels got together to share ideas and work with 7 different presenters who shared lesson skills in all 3 weapons, latest footwork techniques, and most current referee's interpretations of rules and actions. A highlight was an extensive presentation by Maestro Ed Korfanty and his Olympic gold medalist student, Mariel Zagunis.

In the evenings, many coaches opted to take certification exams, demonstrating their teaching skills to a Board of Certified Examiners. The four levels of certification are Assistant Moniteur, Moniteur, Prevot, or Fencing Master. You can obtain certification in one, two, or 3 weapons if you choose. You must first pass a written test prior to taking the practical exam. Congratulations to the following Georgians who recently passed their exams! John Terris, Prevot in Foil and Epee; Bruce Vail, Prevot in Epee; Matt Cole and Rick Shaw, Moniteur in Epee. Gene Gettler was certified as a Head Examiner and John Terris as a Certified Examiner.

Anyone interested in the coaching side of Fencing may join the USFCA. Find a wealth of information, newsletters, certification info, etc at the USFCA website, www.usfca.org. Also stay tuned for USFCA coaching clinics. The first in the SE will be Sept 18-19 at the Foothills Fencing Academy, led by Fencing Masters Gene Gettler and Rick Thompson. struct your referees to enforce the rules requiring two weapons and body cords at the strip, Enforce the penalties for non-conforming equipment.

Making the fencers responsible for their equipment avoid delays. Try to keep every strip in use as often as possible! In the DE's, have a person whose sole job is to distribute bouts to the refs as soon as the previous bout is finished.

A room with empty strips (while there are fencers ready to fence) is a sign of poor management. Common mistakes: Waiting to finish "Table A" (for example), before starting "Table B".

Hint: As fencers are allowed a ten-minute break between bouts, Fencing Time automatically sets a ten-minute clock to delay a new bout until that time has run out. But the data is often entered a minute (at least) after the bout has finished, and it often takes a minute or so to get the new bout assigned – manually set the clock on Fencing Time to seven or eight minutes can speed up your meet while still giving the fencers their allotted down-time.

If you have a long day, planning for referee breaks for lunch, bathroom, etc., should have been part of your planning process – line up potential “filler” referees from your participants early on.

To avoid –

Never leave the control area without putting someone specifically in charge of keeping the tournament moving.

Unless the meet is extremely small and practically running itself, the meet manager should only be a competitor in their own meet in the most unusual of circumstances – and then someone else needs to be put in charge as temporary meet manager.

After the meet: That is, at the end of the day, all results should be sent to the division secretary. The division secretary is the division’s official registry of results, and, as such, the only person who should send the results on to the national office and to the division webmaster. Our by-laws give a three-day window for reporting results, but waiting until the last minute is bad manners. There is a function in Fencing Time that lists the fencers’ USFA numbers as well as their names and club affiliations – the report to the secretary should include that information as well.

AskFred Etiquette

AskFred (www.askfred.net) has developed into a wonderful tool for both competitive fencers and tournament organizers. Suddenly get the urge to jump in your car and go fence somewhere? Go surf AskFred and scope out where meets are being held any given weekend. You can quickly find out who will be there, maybe you can finally get that “C” rating you’ve been trying to earn. Hope springs eternal in the minds of the enthusiastic fencer, whether you are 16 or 60 years young.

Or, you are a tournament host and want to get more exposure for your meet? Put it on AskFred, and you will meet new folks from clubs you never heard of before. As fencers see that your meet is growing, more and more names appear daily. If you use the Fencing Time software in conjunction with AskFred, you will be amazed to see how easily you can download the entries without having to key in all the data, print nice pool sheets, seeding lists and DE tables and bouts just like they do at NAC’s. You can easily upload the results to AskFred the same day of the tournament.

Okay, now for the etiquette lesson. Sign up on AskFred only if you seriously plan to attend that meet. It is very disappointing to both the competitors and the organizer when there are many no-shows at a meet, and the numbers drop below the minimum for giving out certain ratings. Fencers have been known to sign up for 3 or more tournaments *on the same day in different cities*, and going to the “best” meet without removing themselves from the other meets.

Things come up. The kid is sick, the car died, the dog ate your term paper, etc. The Miss Mannerly thing to do is to either remove yourself from the list on AskFred, or email/call the organizer and let them know you will be unable to attend.

Miss Manners would like to credit and thank Peet Sasaki for his creation of the AskFred website, and his service to the fencing world. Look for future Miss Manners articles on the proper way to throw your fencing mask, and how to shake hands without breaking fingers.

Georgia Division Circuit

The Georgia Division (or actually Bob Calvert) keeps an annual tally of points earned by fencers at tournaments within the division. Points are calculated based on the number of tournaments fenced, the finish place in each tournament, and the difficulty of the tournament (how many fencers fenced, and the average rating of the entered fencer). A detailed explanation of the formula used to tally these points can be found on our division website: <http://gafencing.org>. Trophies are given to the top 3 finishers in the Open categories, and certificates are given to the top 3 finishers in all of the other categories. These are awarded during the medal ceremonies at Georgia Division Championships in the summer. The current listing can be found on the division website (<http://gafencing.org>) and it is updated with each tournament.

WHOSE MEET IS IT, ANY- WAY?

Thoughts from outgoing Tournament
Chair, Rudy Volkmann

Recently at one of our division's tournaments things weren't going particularly well, and someone who complained to the organizing table was told "Well, there's nothing we can do about it – it's his meet (pointing to the club owner and meet manager).

It's important for the division's members to know that this is, strictly speaking, not the case. All USFA-sanctioned meets held within the boundaries of the division except those held by the sectional and national offices are The Division's meets. Clubs and individuals cannot hold USFA-sanctioned meets; only the division can hold USFA-sanctioned meets.

So when any club holds a tournament, it is actually hosting the meet on behalf of the division. And it's not their meet – it's the division's.

At the start of the season a meeting is called of the tournament committee (consisting of one representative from each club in the division which hopes to hold a meet) for the purpose of determining the annual competition schedule for the club's members. This meeting is called by the Tournament Chair (an elected officer of the division).

Clubs which host meets agree to a number of conditions. These are found in the procedures section of the by-laws of the Georgia Division (available on the website).

When these conditions are not met or followed, the host manager or club is not living up to its commitment, and be held accountable.

And if you're ever told that conditions in a Georgia Division tournament are the purview of the manager, feel free to point out that it is not "their" meet. As a GA DIV member, it is your meet, and you have every right to insist that the meet be run in accordance to the GA DIV by-laws and procedures.

HISTORICAL NOTE

A few years ago Bill Murphy uncovered an old membership list of the Georgia Division of the AFLA (predecessor of the USFA). Dated 1977, it lists a total of 71 fencers in the division. Of those, only Gene Gettler and I are still members of the GA DIV (Frank Thomiszer is also still fencing, but in another division). Also of those, if memory serves, there were no A's and B's (one somewhat suspect claim to an A notwithstanding), and there were only only a smattering of C's.

National ratings were a lot harder to come by back then (there were no E's and D's). They were so scarce that when you got your national rating, the national office of the AFLA sent you a small star pin (bronze for C, silver for B, and gold for A) which you then affixed to one of three points on the USFA shield which was sewn onto your uniform. Each of the three points of the top of the shield was for a different weapon, so you could tell at a glance what any fencer's rating was and in what weapons (s).

It's worth noting that today the GA DIV has 69 Div I fencers (that is, A,s and B's); nearly the same number of total fencers we had in 1977.
